In pursuit of this objective, management acknowledges that safety procedures and practices may be subject to review, arising from changes in the workplace design, equipment changes or Statutory Directives from both National and EU origins.

The Safety Policy of this company is based on the following points: -

- Standards of safety, health and welfare must be maintained to the highest level.
- The Statutory obligations are the minimum standards for which all management and employees are jointly responsible and the aim should be to attain higher standards.
- An integral part of effective management in our business is awareness that high standards of safety, health and welfare are required.
- This Safety Statement shall be reviewed on a regular basis and its operation monitored.
- Employees at all levels, including full time, part time or seasonal, shall receive sufficient training in safety, health and welfare aspects of the work, to ensure that they are aware of potential hazards and the action required from them to eliminate or overcome those hazards.
- It is a legal requirement; all employees must co-operate to prevent injury to themselves and to others. It is only with this active operation and participation that good health and safe-working conditions may be attained.
